## SPEAKEASY AND THE BOYS – THE EXPERT PANEL SHOW

It did not disappoint! This was yet another show packed with lively discussion of Monday night's hands, dripping with interesting snippets of advice, and peppered with Speakeasy's trademark wisecrack, quip or funny story. So much good stuff transpired, but there's, sadly, only room for a limited selection (especially if you want to hear one or more of the anecdotes). But be sure to attend the next Panel Show on Thursday at 10:30 a.m. so you don't miss a thing! Here is a sampling of some of the gang's suggestions:

Get a Darth Vader kind of mind set when sitting in **pre-emptive non-vul** positions or when **playing against artificial systems** such as the Precision club – i.e. get destructive; make life difficult for your opponents by stealing their bidding space.

**Also, when playing against artificial systems**, be careful about asking for too much information when the opponents alert bids. Some players can get lazy about alerting, but don't press your opponents if you might unwittingly help out them out – the alert procedure can damage you as well as help you, and you can always ask for explanations at the end of an auction. Mack the Lifemaster suggested that most players simply **forget** to alert and that "90% of Bridge players are "true ladies and gentlemen at the table", a comment which, frankly, drew audible gasps, pitying looks, and a muttered, cynical "Well, **that's** a bit of a stretch" from at least one member of the audience.

Speakeasy then reminded us of an artificial bid which he used to play – dubbed by Kantar and Jabbour as the Ezekiel 4 Club bid – which when used and questioned elicited the explanation, "Any time either my partner or I jump to 4 clubs, it means that one of us has completely forgotten the system, has no clue about what's going on, and is in need of immediate and surgical rescue"! (**Editor's Comment:** I'm not sure the bid ever really caught on, but Speakeasy IS playing this week so stay – well - **alert!**)

Graveyard was hot on **timing**. "In Bridge, timing is of the essence", he intoned, "so sometimes don't be afraid to take your tricks slowly - give the opponents the tricks they're due and 9 times out of 10 the card they return will help you". In agreement, Mack pointed out that, in a typical 3NT contract the novice will take the first 8 tricks and lose the next 5, whereas the expert will lose the first 4 tricks and take the last 9. "Let other players do good things for you," added Speakeasy. "You'll generally find that your opponents are on your side".

It was agreed that, if your opponents have **sacrificed** against you, lead trumps every time because the bidding will have been based on distribution and you shouldn't allow them to ruff in both hands. Trump leads protect winners, and there should be no hurry to cash your high cards in this situation.

## **SPEAKEASY AND THE BOYS – THE EXPERT PANEL SHOW (cont'd)**

Before we knew it, the hour (and the page) was up. As well as the great tips, the dynamic amongst the three experts was most enjoyable, but, as it would not be a Speakeasy Panel Show without a couple of memorable stories, and the Maestro did not fail us in this regard, read on:

He recalled that, in the days before screens were used, there were numerous scandals of cheating which became headline news. One such was one in which the great Lou Mathe was called as a witness and, while under examination, was asked, "Where in the bridge world would you rank yourself as a player?" His swift and sure reply was, "Without doubt, I am the best Bridge player that ever lived!", a claim which caused his wife, observing in the stands, much chagrin. She later chastised him, asking him how he could have embarrassed her in such a way, to which he replied, equally swiftly and surely, "But, darling, I WAS under oath!"

And, finally, a story that had us all a-buzz in the elevator after the show. In 2000, Bermuda hosted the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Bermuda Bowl, and all the finest players in the world came here to compete, including Speakeasy's hero, the incomparable Brazilian Gabriel Chagas. Chagas apparently always travels with his mega vintage and expensive wine, and graciously allowed the Chosen to share a dribble while he himself knocked back a goblet full. Suddenly, to the collective horror of the assembled Few, a rookie wine waiter proceeded to top up Chagas's glass with **THE HOUSE MERLOT!** What the great man said is not recorded for posterity, but it would no doubt have been uttered in the many languages of which he was capable! And the waiter? Well, he hasn't be seen since!

## **ROBERT TODD ON HIS TOD – EXPERT LECTURE**



In his amiable, conversational style, Robert focussed on what he called a new generation of opening bidders, whose aim, especially on marginal hands, is to get in and out of the bidding as quickly as possible in order to "get the hand off their chest".

"One reason to open is to keep your partner under control," he said, "because if you pass, partner can get creative and this is rarely what you want. Bid aggressively early to try and find a fit and then get out of the way."

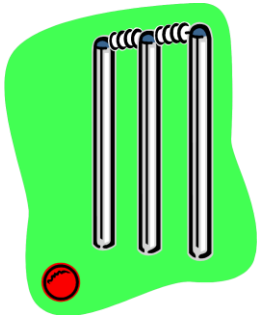
He especially sang the praises of the NT opening bid. "It's holistic, carrying messages about points and shape, without giving away too much information about your hand. In addition, NT bids have useful tools attached, such as Stayman and transfers. But, above all, an opening NT bid is pre-emptive, forcing the opponents to the next level before they've drawn breath. The most frequent hand type for opening is balanced and 12-14 anyway, so why not open a NT? Open 1NT as often as possible!"

**"In opening, don't think about not having winners, but about not having losers!"**

## LOCAL LORE/BERMUDA BITS (RE-RUN from 2011)

That's another nail in what looked like being a very good score!

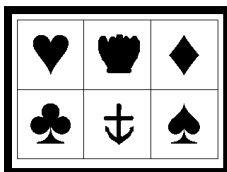

## LOCAL LORE/BERMUDA BITS (NEW for 2012)

During the annual Cup Match holiday, if you happen upon a group of people huddled noisily in a corner, the game of cricket furthest from their minds, then more likely than not they will be indulging in another of Bermuda's national pastimes - the game of Crown and Anchor, a simple dice game, originating in the 18<sup>th</sup> century and legalized especially by the Bermuda government for this holiday.

Three special dice are used, equal in size and shape to standard dice, but instead of one through six pips, they are marked with six symbols: crown, anchor, diamond, spade, club and heart (you might be familiar with these last four!)



The game is played between a player and a banker on a mat such as the one pictured left. The player places bets on one or more symbols. He then throws the three dice. If there is a bet on any symbol which comes up on one or more of the dice, the banker pays the player the amount of his stake for each die showing that symbol: even money if one, 2:1 if two, and 3:1 if three. If the symbol doesn't come up, the player loses his bet.

For those of you interested in the odds - on average, the player will win 92.1% of the amount he bets; that is, over time he will lose 7.9% of whatever he bets. Thus, the banker has a substantial edge. In a game at a festival or in a casino, the house will be banker; in a game among friends, each person might serve as banker in turn.

Take the excitement generated by a game of Crown and Anchor, add a heaping of hot summer sun, drizzle liberally with dark and stormies, and top with Bermudian friendship and fun ..... and your Cup Match runneth over!

**Auction Analysis:**

My 1♥ overcall isn't for everyone... I'd like a heart lead if partner is on lead, and since they are a passed hand, there isn't such a big danger of them hanging me. In addition, if partner has the Ace of hearts, the opponents won't be able to play in 3N anymore, as their stopper asks will be fruitless. 1♥ has tactical advantages, but could backfire if partner has the wrong hand.

**Play Notes:**

Against 3N, I led the HK, which held the trick, with partner playing the 9 (Upside-Down)... I could tell our chances on defense were slim: Partner's 3♥ bid was pre-emptive, so any hopes of taking tricks in another suit were nearly nonexistent. I continued with the HQ, which declarer won. Partner's heart carding could just be discouraging, however declarer's heart play only makes sense from a doubleton: Holding Axx of hearts, they would likely suspect something was awry and hold up a second time. Declarer now played a spade to the Queen, and the CQ off dummy, partner playing the King, and declarer the Ace. Declarer now played the Jack of clubs... What's your discard?

Partner likely has 5 hearts, but the suit is hopelessly blocked, so even if partner could win a club trick, we'll still only be able to score 3 hearts and 1 club. If partner didn't have the C9, we weren't beating this hand. My only chance was to hope declarer didn't guess the club suit correctly... I pitched the HJ on the CJ, then on the next club, I pitched the HT. Partner won their C9, and could now cash three heart tricks to defeat the contract. This is a good example of the difference between IMPs and Matchpoints. At Matchpoints, I would have to decide whether partner has 5 hearts, and if so, whether it is worthwhile to pitch my heart winners. At IMPs, the decision was easy.

We won our KO match in the afternoon, and are in the Semi-finals tomorrow!

Our first hand out of the box in the Tuesday Night Championship Pairs (2<sup>nd</sup> Session of M-T Pairs) was played against Roman Smolski and Vera Petty. On this hand Roman worked some magic against us (again!)

I was on opening lead and unfortunately I led a ♣, which took Roman off his ♣ guess at trick 1. My partner won his ♠A (-1) and returned a ♣(+1.) Roman next crossed to the ♠Q (+2) and led the ♦J. This was covered by the ♦K and won in his hand with the ♦A (+3.) Roman now cashed his three other ♠ winners (+6.) On the 4<sup>th</sup> round of ♠ my partner had to discard a red card. He didn't know it at the time, but he was in a funny squeeze. He discarded a ♦ (discarding a ♥ would have setup dummy's ♥ and forced him to discard again later - more on this below.) Roman now cashed his three top ♥ ending in the dummy (+9.)

Now Roman had reached an interesting end position. With ♥ being 4-2 he had to play for the squeeze on my partner (as it had worked.) He took a ♦ finesse to his ♦9 (+10.), cashed the ♦Q (+11) and had my partner's ♦10 fall allowing his ♦8 to be his last trick. 12 tricks for +990!

An interesting note is if ♥ had been 3-3 the hand would have been even more interesting (give my partner one of my ♣ and give me one of his ♥.) Now my partner would have discarded his extra ♣ on the long ♠ and on the 13<sup>th</sup> ♥ we would both have to discard a ♦. I would also have to discard a ♦ at this point (keeping the ♠Q and a ♦.) But this would leave Roman with a guess. Had I stipped the ♦10 (should he play for the drop) or did my partner have it and should he play for the finesse?. A tough guess and an amazing end position. *Can you see what my partner could have done?* If he had discarded a ♥ (giving Roman an extra ♥ trick) he would have given him a losing option – now Roman would have been faced with the guess of taking the finesse in ♦ or playing for the ♦ drop. I would have loved to see Roman try to tackle that problem?!? I suspect he would have got it right, but it would have been stellar defence to put him to the test!\
